



## Special Education Resources

To be eligible for special education, a child must have a disability and must need special education services and related services.

To find out if your child is eligible for special education, contact your local school and make a special education referral for your child.

Decisions about special education eligibility must be made by a team that includes the child's parent. Parents are entitled to all evaluation reports and documentation about how eligibility decisions are made.
