As an AL provider, you will support the client's goals in learning new skills or keeping existing ones such as establishing a residence, home living, health and safety, self-protection, advocacy, and living in a community. You will work with a client who lives in their own home, or in their parent's home.



What is Alternative Living?

- Alternative Living supports improve a person's quality of life by connecting them with the community and increasing or maintaining life skills needed to live independently.
- Alternative Living provides one-on-one services for individuals who need assistance maintaining or increasing independence at home and in the community.

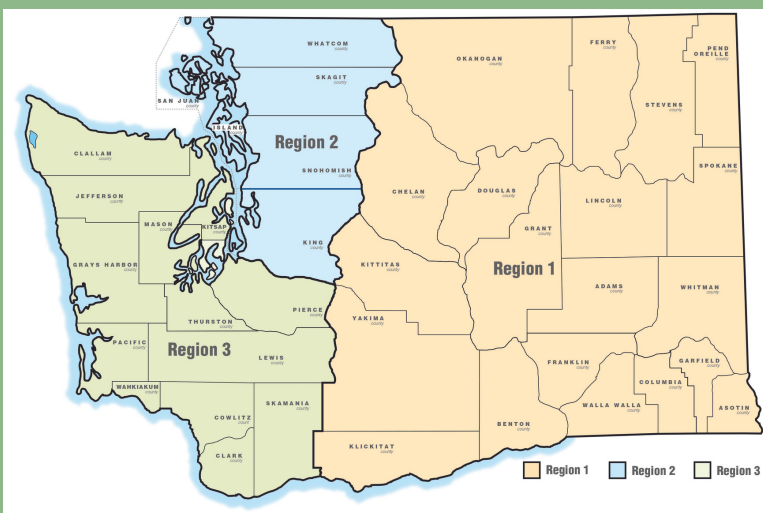
As an AL provider you will be able to:

- Set your own schedule, choose how many hours you work per week, and even work around an existing job!
- Meet and select the clients you want to work with.
- Receive hourly rate of pay and be reimbursed for training hours.
